

**A Bill to Draft to Fill the Military's Recruiting Needs
Annually**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE
ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1: A military draft shall be enacted requiring all persons living in the United States of America who, by their twentieth birthday, have not received a high school diploma or G.E.D., will be placed in a lottery to serve two years in the military until the manpower need is filled.

SECTION 2: All persons male and female shall be required to register within 30 days of their twentieth birthday with the Selective Service System, and to serve two years in the military if they are selected through a lottery to be conducted through the Selective Service System.

SECTION 3: The Selective Service System shall be responsible for overseeing the registration, lottery, and draft of individuals to fill the annual need for entry level manpower for the U.S. Army, U.S. Navy, U.S. Air Force, U.S. Marine Force, and U.S. Coast Guard. Persons who fail to register with the Selective Service System within 30 days of their twentieth birthday or who fail to report for duty after they have been drafted for military service may be denied benefits or a job and be subject to house arrest.

SECTION 4: This bill shall become effective on December 1, 2013.

SECTION 5: All laws or portions of laws conflicting with the proportions of this legislation shall be declared null and void.

A Bill to Repeal the Death Penalty

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS STUDENT CONGRESS HERE
ASSEMBLED

Section 1: The United States should repeal the death penalty system used as form of punishment.

Section 2: The death penalty is defined as sentencing a criminal, who committed murder, to his demise.

Section 3: This legislation shall go into effect on December 15th, 2013.

Section 4: All laws or bills in conflict with the provisions of this legislation are here by declared null and void.

A Resolution to Ban Schools from Disciplining Student Behavior on Social Networking Sites

WHEREAS, students have a first amendment right to freedom of speech; and

WHEREAS, school officials should not have jurisdiction over student behavior when students are away from school property or school functions; and

WHEREAS, a student's personal life should not be controlled by the school nor should the school be reaching into the home to act as a replacement parent; and

WHEREAS, it would be difficult to establish clear policies regarding acceptable use of social media for students outside school hours; and

WHEREAS, students who have been punished by schools for their participation in social media often have broken no laws; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, by the Student Congress here assembled, that public schools should not be allowed to take disciplinary actions against students because of materials posted on social networking sites.
